students were very appreciative.

does charity things differently. They don't give out individual students names, but go through





De LaSalle is a private high school for students from low income families in the Portland area. Their emphasis is on college prep curriculum. All students do an internship in local businesses in the Portland area prior to graduation.


The school's rate of successful college bound students is impressive.

Representatives from the Missing in America Project (MIAP) were on hand to receive a check for \$2500. For the second year in a row, the Pharaohs were able to present the MIAP with the entire net proceeds from their annual MIAP Benefit Cruise-In, held in July. The MIAP, which is the Pharaohs primary mission, works to locate, identify, and inter the unclaimed cremains of our Veterans. Many of these remains are left sitting on the shelves of funeral homes and hospitals across the country. To date the MIAP has interred the cremains of over 1700 Veterans.




suffers from PTSD. Oregon's suicide rate among Veteran's is 37% higher than the national average. Tom Parke was on hand to accept donations totaling \$2120. Parker shared the variety of services the group offers to Veteran's and their families. The money will help them to get additional volunteers, mostly Veteran's, trained and on the phones to be able to help those in need.

The Pharaohs had special commemorative dash plaques that were given to each Veteran and first responder as they registered, and the balance were available to the other participants for a monetary donation of their choice. Then all of the Veteran's and first responders were invited to come up for special recognition from the group.
